## DARAJA

DARAJA successfully hosted its [co-design workshops](#) in Nairobi and Dar es Salaam in February. The workshops were well attended, and involved strong contributions from representatives from Kenya Meteorological Department (KMD) and Tanzania Meteorological Agency (TMA). Also in attendance were the Red Cross, respective officials from each city, media representatives and the resident groups from several informal settlements. Both KMD and TMA's contributions to the pilot design process were greatly appreciated by all stakeholders. The DARAJA Consortium presented the initial research findings and a skeleton information ecosystems mapping of each city. The overall outcome were the collaboratively designed potential pilot projects for each of the two cities. Alongside this, pilot coordination groups were formed with representatives from each stakeholder group, who will continue to work with the DARAJA Consortium Partners towards rolling out the pilots. Later in the month Resurgence and KDI presented the skeleton information ecosystems map of Nairobi at the Hague Planetary Security Conference and [led a workshop exercise using the scenario of a water vendor developed under WISER](#).

## **Climate Research for Development (CR4D) to award research grants**

The Economic Commission for Africa's (ECA) Climate Research for Development (CR4D) initiative is set to award up to 20 climate research grants in May 2019 on priorities that will contribute to bridging the gap between climate research and development in Africa. A total of 180 full submissions were received earlier in the year by the Africa Academy of Sciences (AAS), which is partnering with the ECA to manage the grants.

A panel of external reviewers included members of the CR4D Scientific Advisory Committee and other experts across all the fields of climate research. Each manuscript received was reviewed by two expert reviewers and scored against standard set criteria.

The CR4D Project Executive Committee, subsequently assessed 60 proposals (based on the external review scores) and selected 30 candidates who were invited for face to face interviews.

The 20 selected researchers will commence their fellowships in May 2019 with the aim of addressing Africa's most pressing climate challenges as indicated in the call.

## **2nd CR4D Institutional Collaboration Platform (ICP)**

The 2nd CR4D ICP meeting convened in February 2019 and assessed the CR4D progress since the first Institutional Collaboration Platform (ICP) meeting, provided advice on implementation of the 5-year CR4D Strategic Plan, including resource mobilisation, reviewed the research grants management framework and considered the dual role of the Africa Academy of Sciences (AAS) as the ICP chair and CR4D research grants management institution.

The event, attended by the ICP member institutions from across the continent, also deliberated on modalities for provision of policy guidance to the CR4D Oversight Board, especially on strategies to enhance uptake of climate research outcomes at policy level.
